Ans. 1. All Meetings for worship and discipline
 have been duly held excepting Eight omitted

in the Winter on account of Storms. Those on First day
 Morning have been punctually attended by our Members
 generally, so far as circumstances have permitted.
 Those on First day evenings and in the middle of the
 week continue to be neglected by many: Unbecoming
 behavior has been avoided.

Ans. 2. We believe we have love one to another in
 accordance with our Christian Profession; tale-
 bearing and detraction are discouraged. We know
 of no differences among us.

Ans. 3. We believe Friends endeavor by example
 and precept to bring up their children, and those
 under their care, in the nurture and admonition
 of the Lord, and in becoming plainness and simplicity
 of life: Also that they counsel them against per-
 nicious reading and corrupt associations, and encour-
 age them to read the Holy Scriptures. Some exception
 is noted in one report.

Ans. 4. Friends appear to maintain our testimony
 to a free Gospel Ministry agreeable to our discipline.

Ans. 5. With a few exceptions Friends maintain our
 testimony against the use of all intoxicating liquors,
 and generally, avoid drinking houses, and frivolous
 and demoralizing places of diversion.

Ans. 6. The circumstances of those requiring aid,
 are inspected, and advice and relief extended
 when deemed necessary.

Ans. 7. Friends Children of suitable age, attend
 School, and when practicable, Schools under the
 care of Friends. One report states that most
 Friends are careful to so place their Children.

Ans. 8. Friends maintain a testimony against Oaths,
 Military services, clandestine trade, prize goods, lotteries
 and Slavery.

Ans. 9. Friends endeavor to live within the bounds
