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At an adjourned session of Baltimore Quarterly Meeting of Friends held in Baltimore 11th Mo. 9th 1894. Two of the Representatives (Men) not present at our former session are now in attendance.

The following memorial of our late dear friend Joseph N. Jolliffe, as revised by the Committee to whom it was referred at our former session, was read & approved & directed to be signed by our Clerks and forwarded to the Representative Meeting.

"A memorial of Hopewell Monthly Meeting of Friends concerning Joseph N. Jolliffe, an Elder, deceased.

"He was the son of W^m & Rebecca Jolliffe, & was born 4th Mo. 10th 1813, & departed this life 4th Mo. 20th 1894, in the 82nd year of his age.

"He was married in 1842, 9th Mo. 2nd to Sarah E. Janney, daughter of Geo. & Susannah B. Janney of Loudoun Co, Va, who, with three sons, & two daughters, survives him.

"In his early manhood, under the operation of the Holy Spirit, he gave his heart to a crucified & risen Saviour, & endeavored through a long life to walk uprightly before the Lord & his fellow men.

"From boyhood he felt & manifested great sympathy for those held in bondage around him, & ever maintained an earnest protest against the sin & inhumanity of slavery, thereby incurring the displeasure of some of his neighbors who upheld the system as right.
