7th. We believe Friends are careful to live within the bounds of their circumstances, and to avoid involving themselves in business beyond their ability to manage. As far as appears, they are just in their dealings, and punctual in complying with their engagements.

8th. Friends maintain our testimony against slavery those of the African race under their care, are suitably provided

for and some care is taken to instruct them in useful learning.

9th. Care is mostly taken to deal with offenders, reasonably and impartially, and to evince to those who will not be reclaimed a spirit of meekness and love before they are disowned.

10th. None.

12th. Friends are careful so far as practicable to place their children for tuition, under the care of suitable teachers, in membership with us.
