which amount must shortly be considerably increased from the decayed and almost disreputable situation of the out buildings and enclosures of the property

In the 7th month 1809. a communication was received from the monthly meeting of Baltimore for the Western District stating that "the members of that meeting have clear and equal rights, titles and privileges in the property in common with the members of the Baltimore Monthly Meeting for the Eastern District." - which was considered to be a claim both unreasonable and oppressive (excepting that of the privilege of the Interment of their members in the burying ground which they were at liberty at all times freely to partake of) especially when the property was so reduced after the forced sale of that part to complete the finishing of the new meeting house, that the balance remaining was no more than will conveniently answer the purposes for which it

was confirmed by the Legislature, viz

For a meeting house and yards

Burying grounds

Lot for a school house

With dwelling house and small garden for a schoolmaster or some other person to take care of the premises - that it could not with propriety be submitted to

They therefore pursued the subject to the Quarterly Meeting and two successive Yearly Meetings as will appear by the minutes and proceedings forwarded for examination.

We now think it may be right to turn our attention to some of the representations contained in their present narrative - wherein they state, ^{that} the monthly meeting of Baltimore for the Eastern District having refused to admit any right of friends of the Western District to the property, an appeal was carried to our Yearly Meeting for the reasons before assigned it was considered that they could have no just claim to it, more than any other monthly meeting - but that friends of that monthly meeting were at liberty to enter in our Grounds as heretofore subject to the direction of and order established by our monthly meeting - of which conclusion they
