Deed from John Deaver to John Cornthwait Deaver to and Gerard Hopkins, bearing date the 6th of June 1773 for certain property therein described; To hold for the use of the Society of Christian People called Quakers, inhabiting and dwelling in and near the town and County of Baltimore to enclose and keep the same for a burying place to bury or inter those of the same society that may from time to time depart this life, and also to erect or build a meeting house for the same society and people for the worship of Almighty God, and other business concerning the affairs of said society of people, called Quakers, according to the custom and manner used and practised by the said society and people called Quakers

Edu^d Flannagan and Elix^h his wife to John Deaver deed bearing date the 9th of March 1786 reciting the former deed from Tho^s Sligh to John Deaver, and that the same was omitted by accident to be recorded; and Elix^h Flannagan is the heir at law of Tho^s Sligh being the Daughter of W^m Sligh who was the son and heir at law of Tho^s Sligh to hold the property described in the original deed to the only proper use and behoof of the Society of Christians known and distinguished by the title of friends (and now in the possession of said society) their successors and assigns forever

Deed from William Young and Mary Young to John McKim and Jos. Townsend, bearing date the 11th of Jan^y 1793, for two lots of ground on York Street lately owned by R. Young Stokes to hold the same for the use of the Society of people called Quakers for the purpose of being occupied as a meeting house, and burial ground for the said Society

Deed from Gerard Hopkins and others to Isaac Tyson and others conveying the whole of the property described
