

to Baltimore Town (now City of Baltimore) known and distinguished on a Plat thereof by the number [691] the hundred and ninety one; which is contained within the following rates and bounds to wit, Beginning for the same at the end of Eight perches east from the intersection of Cutaw and Lombard streets, and running east bounding on Lombard street, four perches, then South to Whiskey alley, thence west four perches on Whiskey alley, thence North to the beginning. To hold the said lot or parcel of ground and premises with the appurtenances unto the said James Ellicott, Philip C. Thomas, William Dyson, John Ellicott Jr. James Gillingham, and John Marsh their heirs and assigns forever. In Trust Nevertheless, and for the several uses, intents and purposes therein and herein after mentioned, that is to say, In the first place, that the said lot or parcel of ground together with any buildings

or improvements that might be erected thereon should be, and continue to be for the use and service of the Society or congregation of People called Quakers, in the city of Baltimore, and upon this further trust, that the said Trustees, when thereto required, should by a good and sufficient deed convey and transfer, the said Lot of ground and premises, to such person or persons and to and for such uses and purposes as might and should be appointed, limited and agreed upon by a Baltimore Monthly Meeting of the said congregation, when convened agreeably to the rules and regulations of the said Society: Provided Always that neither the said James Ellicott, Philip C. Thomas, William Dyson, John Ellicott Jr. James Gillingham and John Marsh or any person or persons succeeding them in that trust, which should thereafter fall from or change his or their religious principles aforesaid or depart from the
