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yearly meeting - & as still not disposed to acquiesce therein - the most unexceptionable course would be to enter a protest against the proceedings under the hope that a future yearly meeting may see these affairs in a different point of view & redress the wrongs now felt & complained of -

The trustees in the mean time will continue to hold the property as they have heretofore done this

Gentlemen

Yours of 4th inst has been received in consequence of my nice and professional engagements since it was recd. My recollection of particulars is probably very imperfect in relation to the subject of your letter but if it can aid in any manner to correct mistake on either side or in any way promote harmony amongst you as you seem to suppose I shall not regret the trouble it costs me to state what are my impressions -

I did understand the settlement agreed on in the Committee room to be final in relation to the property and that the gentlemen attending on the one part had been fully authorized to effect this settlement by the proper authority according to the discipline of the Church -

I did not understand that the Committee stood pledged that all proceedings then depending against members who had signed the memorial of the Eastern district ^{should cease} on the contrary my impression is that one of them in conversation remarked that they were not authorized to say that anything should be done to arrest the ordinary discipline for whatever ^{offence} had been ^{previously charged} - but I certainly expected from the manner in which the business was closed as well as from the conversation of the gentlemen that they would exert all their influence whether individual or official to restore
