Jan 29. 1833

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Seventh, Friends generally are careful to live within the bounds of their circumstances. and to avoid involving themselves in business beyond their abilities to manage. to be just in their dealings and in a good degree punctual in complying with their engagements. I seldom find any reasonable ground for fear in these respects. Care is extended to them;

Eighth, As far as appears Friends are careful to bear a Testimony against Slavery. Those of the African race in Friends families appear to be suitably provided for and ^{some} care is taken to instruct them in useful learning;

Ninth, Endeavours are used to deal with offenders. Seasonably and impartially. and to induce to those who will not be reclaimed the spirit of meekness & love before they are disowned;

Tenth, None

Twelfth, Much difficulty is experienced by Friends for want of good Schools taught by Teachers in membership with us, & we fear that Friends Children generally are under the tuition of Teachers that members of our Religious Society;
