

Class taught by Joseph P. Elliott has an average attendance of thirteen (13) men and is greatly enjoyed by them - This School is supported mainly by the Federal Hill Members themselves - the weekly contributions of the Scholars amounted last year to \$57.44 and except \$5. to the Sunday-School Union all go to Foreign Missions -

The Household School for Girls has an average attendance of forty eight girls and three regular teachers - All kinds of household work, including cooking are taught - The girls are much interested, new scholars are coming in and more teachers are needed -

The Free Kindergarten has an Enrollment of forty four (44) little ones from the very poorest homes, with two regular teachers - A good lunch is given to the children at noon and habits of order and neatness and courtesy are formed in the children as well as imparting to them the usual instruction - A wonderful improvement is manifest -

The Young Folks Union of Federal Hill has a meeting on the last second day of

each month at which they have some kind of literary exercises, such as debates, declamations and essays - All meetings are opened with Scripture reading -

The Reading Room is open every 2nd day night - The Temperance Committee reports four public addresses on 1st day afternoons, one public lecture and magic lantern exhibition at Cedar St Meeting house - About 450 tracts and 100 temperance papers have been distributed and some of our members are engaged in publishing a monthly temperance paper called the "Snap-Book" of which 3,300 copies have already been issued -
