

1. Lot corner of Cutaw & Monument streets, 137 X 72 feet, bought 3rd Mo. 1864 at a cost of \$15,000. improved by a brick meeting house, 71 X 54 feet, built in 1867 at a cost of \$31,000. - of which \$6276.⁰⁰ was paid out of the funds of the Yearly Meeting; also, by a brick school-house, 72 X 29, built in 1875 by Thomas Wilson and presented to the Monthly Meeting, and now rented at \$800. per annum for a girls school of high grade. The total cost of the improvements made by Thomas Wilson was \$19,000. -

2. Lot on Light st near Hamburg st 56 X 331 ft, bought 2nd Mo. 1871 at a cost of \$6500. - (of which \$3,000. - was contributed by Miles White) improved by a brick Mission House 42 X 120 ft, built in 1880 at a cost of \$14,600. including fencing, paving & furnishing. Also, on the rear of the same lot, the five small dwelling houses mentioned previously.

Besides the above-described property in Baltimore, the Monthly Meeting is the owner of

3. The meeting-house lot in Ashton, Montgomery Co, Md. comprising half an acre, bought in 1880 for \$145., and of the frame meeting house thereon, built in the same year at a cost of \$865. - of which the Friends living there contributed \$265. -

4. Lot of one acre in Lincoln, Loudoun Co. Va. bought in 1885 for \$100. - and of the brick meeting house thereon, built in 1886 at a cost of \$2850. - including horse-sheds. The furniture & stoves cost \$200. - making a total cost of \$3150. in money, of which Lincoln Friends contributed about \$300. - besides hauling materials, labor, etc, estimated at about \$700. - more, which should be also counted in the cost of the house. There is a debt of \$360. - still remaining on the
