mo. and that in the conduct of the  
women there was no complaint to make.

At Cheston on behalf of the committee  
to visit during the week reported having  
made a visit to the prisoners during  
which they had a very satisfactory interview  
with the Matron. The same friends were  
continued for further service in this way, as  
they may find it necessary.

Julia Wilson was appointed to look visit  
next mo. with H. Lytle

Then adjourned  
H. Lytle Secy.

At a Meeting of Friends Association for  
visiting the Penitentiary held 4<sup>th</sup> mo 14<sup>th</sup>  
a small number of Friends present -

The prison has been visited since  
our last meeting except one afternoon  
when rain prevented. The deportment  
of the women has generally been satisfactory.  
The last first day there was so much levity  
and inattention as to require rebukes which

however was well received and we  
thought produced a good effect. The Matron  
has spoken well of their conduct during the  
week - Francis Wright, a yellow girl has  
been dismissed and two have been received,  
Mary Ann Wheeler and Milkie Cornish, both  
colored women -

Matilda Read and Hannah Lytle were  
appointed to visit during the ensuing month  
Then adjourned

At a Meeting of Friends Association for  
visiting the Prison held 6<sup>th</sup> mo  
a few Friends present.

There was no meeting of our Association  
last mo. yet there has been a regular attendance  
at the prison. So many friends are absent  
that the labor devolves on a few - and as the  
winter is now very warm - it is the judgment of  
this meeting that there be a suspension of our  
school during the summer - it being left  
optional however with any friend who may  
deem it his duty, to visit at her pleasure -

And we earnestly hope that amongst the  
few friends who may be left in the city,  
an interest may be kept alive for these  
poor prisoners - and that they will occasionally
