pretty good - and the account which the
matron gives of their conduct during the
week is more encouraging than we could
expect considering their crowded condition.
A friend informed the meeting that
any further effort in the case of Phoebe
Myers would be unnecessary - as the
morning papers announce that her
pardon has been granted by the
Governor.

of our visiting committee during the summer
months - Several of the committee of last mo -

minds of some of our friends, to endeavor

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to collect a library for the benefit of the
male prisoners more especially - they have
conversed with the Warden and find that
he considers it very desirable for the
improvement of the convicts. They have
also had an interview with S Guiteau
Secretary of the Tract Society - who gives
them hope that he will be able to
aid them in the furtherance of this design.
It was concluded that it would be
well to suspend any further action in
the matter - until our duties at the
Prison are resumed in the Fall -
