the attention bestowed upon them, induce us
to hope, that words of kindness and gentleness
will have a softening and purifying influence
upon their characters, and gradually prepare
the way for the reception of a knowledge of
the truth. And altho our labors may be long
without much visible effects may we be
encouraged to persevere, trusting ^{that} the seed
sown in faith, will in time bring forth some
fruit to His praise and glory, in whose strength
and under whose guidance we desire to
act in this work.—

meetings are convened, should be dispensed
with and that Friends should be careful

that they would not furnish the prisoners
with newspapers or periodicals of any kind
without his inspection, and that they should
be careful to give them no information
respecting matters passing without the walls
of the prison—
