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They have generally been neat & tidy in appearance & punctual in assembling at the appointed hour. Two have been confined to the cell for quarrelling & swearing - there have been no cases of disorderly conduct reported of the others, and with one exception we have found no occasion for reproof whilst they have been assembled in school. The snuff has nearly disappeared. Rose Herbert had none last week. Tobacco is substituted when they can procure it from the men, yet we consider even this so great an improvement, as to furnish no occasion for remark to them at present - we hope in time to be able to induce them to relinquish this also.

Four colored women have been admitted this month. Catharine Golder for four years and Elizabeth Dorsey, Betsey Floyd & Mary Brown each for two years -

Besides the three women mentioned in the last report two others have been discharged this month. Anna Maria Steves & Jane Dunn both of whom returned to their friends. Jane Dunn has been to see two members of the committee accompanied by her Aunt a respectable looking colored woman, who expressed herself very grateful for the care of Friends, saying Jane had learned some very useful lessons,

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and she hoped had, under their instructions had her eyes opened in a manner she would not forget. She is desirous to obtain a place. Poor Sophy Crawford returned at once to her old habits, and two weeks after leaving the prison, had disposed of her shoes and nearly all the clothing which was given her when she left - She called on one of the committee drunk - barefooted and ragged, and measures were promptly taken to have her conveyed to the almshouse where she now is.

Catharine Smith has visited with the committee during the whole month, and we find such a decided advantage in having fire to attend that we think it would be well to appoint that number of monthly visitors whenever practicable. After the recitations have been made, there is too much talking amongst the women particularly in the white class, and we would suggest that some plan of instruction be adopted, which will more occupy their time.

It was proposed that the distributions of presents be made but once in three months and that no rewards be given in the intermediate time to those not worthy to receive them on the day of distribution. W. A. Tyron, Julia Wilson Phile Thomas and Mary Brooks were appointed a standing committee to make the distributions
