besides there is a new Warden (Isaac
Henson having resigned) with whom the
Committee have not yet had an interview.

During a recent visit to Philadelphia
Julia Wilson visited the Moyamensing Prison
and there learned that Mary Agnes
Boyle had been recently confined there
upon charge of theft - but she interested
the Matron so much by her excellent
behavior - and her great anxiety to
obtain a German Bible - that she interceded
on her behalf, and procured her discharge
without being brought to trial - It is
discouraging indeed thus to trace the
downward career of one, whose whole
department seemed to afford reasonable ground
for hope of amendment - but a deceiver
has she been from the beginning - and

altho her hypocrisy ¹¹¹ has thus far
availed her much - yet it cannot be
always so - The way of the transgressor is
hard - and unless speedily arrested in
her course - we anticipate for Agnes Boyle
a sorrowful and disgraceful termination
of her miserable career of vice.

Julia Wilson also saw Margaret Caton
in Phil^a - she appeared neat and comfortable
and expressed great gratitude for all
that had been done for her -
