

A regular meeting of the Association for Christian Work was held in the lower room of the Meeting House on Wednesday evening, May 10th 1905.

The President opened the meeting by reading a chapter in the Bible, after which the minutes of the four preceding meetings were read and approved with two alterations.

It being the annual meeting for the presentation of reports of the various branches of work of the Association, the reports were read by the Secretary, the meeting expressing its appreciation of the work and the encouraging results of the committees.

The reports were, in brief, as follows:

Elizabeth C. Platto, chairman of the Entertainment Committee, reported that six socials had been held, and also a supper provided at the quarterly meeting time.

Eugenia H. Parker, chairman of the Junior Fellowship Union reported that for the better instruction and entertainment of its members the Union was divided into two divisions, meeting sometimes together, and again separately; that during the past Winter their meetings have been very interesting, and the subjects discussed instructive.

The Girls Sewing School opened the eleventh month, 1904, and had been regularly held through the Winter, with the exception of the Christmas Holidays, until the fourth month, 15th, 1905, with good results.

James Carey Jr., Superintendent of the Boys' meeting reported that the season had opened in October, 1904, closing in March, 1905, and that the increased interest manifested was owing largely to the faithfulness of the teachers.

Alice Brooks reported from the mother's meeting that notwithstanding the inclement weather during the past Winter, the meetings had been well attended, and increased interest was manifested.

Richard J. White, chairman of the Seating Committee, reported that every First Day Meeting, and all special meetings had been looked after by his Committee. He also reported on behalf of the Committee on Entertainments that six entertainments had been held, five of which were illustrated lectures.

Margaret T. Carey, chairman of the Young Women's Fellowship Union held meetings from October to May, with an average of from twenty-five to thirty-five.

John N. Parker, treasurer, reported a balance of \$286.60 on hand.

Margaret T. Carey reported that Sarah P. White had presented a new stereopticon sheet to the Association, for which the meeting expressed its gratitude.

On the committee to audit the accounts of the Treasurer were appointed Isaac Brooks Jr. and Katharine M. Brevitt.

The Secretary was requested to enter on the minutes the desire of the Association for a meeting of the Executive Committee, composed of the officers of the Association, and the chairmen of the various committees, and that this committee should prepare and report a simple constitution for the use of the Association.
