The jurist referred to the International Labor Defense League without naming it in connection with "another case" on the Eastern Shore. He meant by "another case" was the slaying of Green K. Davis and his family by Euel Lee, a negro, who since has been convicted of one of the slayings and sentenced to death. The conviction has been appealed.

Williams, an employe of Elliott, went into the office of the lumberman on December 4 while the latter was talking over the telephone. The negro fired his pistol into the employer's body and tried to flee.

Elliott's son saw Williams running away from the scene of the crime and fired at him. One of the bullets hit the negro who with his own gun inflicted a less serious wound on himself.

Williams was taken to the Peninsula General Hospital where a mob of more than 2,000 gathered that night. Police authorities stopped the mob at the main entrance but six of the mobsmen entered a side door, dragged the negro from his bed and took him to the court house where they hanged him to a tree.
